#### Report of the Incorporators:

At a special meeting of the Executive Committee of the Pan American Sports Organization held in San Jose, Costa Rica, in August, 1957, the Third Pan American Games were assigned to Chicago. In attendance at that meeting, representing Chicago, were Michael J. McDermott, later to be named Chairman of the Organizing Committee; Alderman Ralph Metcalfe; and Colonel Jack Reilly, Retired, who was named Executive Director.

Returning to Chicago, acting on instructions from Mayor Richard J. Daley, McDermott, Metcalfe and Reilly applied for Articles of Incorporation as a Non-Profit Corporation, with the purpose of conducting the Pan American Games.

The services of established leaders in all the sports which made up the Pan American Games program were enlisted, and a Sports Committee was activated. From the Sports Committee an Executive Committee was named to develop and further plans for the conduct of the Games.

Mayor Daley's Youth Foundation advanced funds for financing the establishment of an organization, and the City of Chicago later appropriated \$50,000.00 to cover initial expenses.

The Sports Committee immediately commenced an inventory of existing facilities. The survey indicated that existing swimming pools were inadequate for competition of this importance. A new, modern pool, built to Olympic Games Specifications, was constructed in Portage Park by the Chicago Park District at a cost of \$850,000.00.

While the initial presentation accompanying the invitation to hold the Games in Chicago showed Northwestern University Dyche Stadium as the site for the Track and Field events, at the urging of officials of the U. S. Olympic Committee the track and field events were rescheduled for Soldier Field and an en-tou-cas imported track was built at a cost of some ninety thousand dollars.

Chicago had no velodrome. Permission was received from the Chicago Park District to build one in-

side the Gately Stadium, utilizing the existing stadium seats for spectators. Through the generous cooperation of Ragnor Benson, one of Chicago's major building contractors, it was possible to complete this project for \$50,000.00.

To provide shooting ranges built to international competition specifications it was necessary to go well outside the city limits of Chicago. The City of Waukegan offered to make available a site on the shore of Lake Michigan. This proved to be a major engineering and construction job. Tons and tons of earth had to be moved, and were it not for generous contributions of materials, equipment and services, the range would have cost an astronomical figure. As it was, more than one hundred thousand dollars in cash had to be expended. Full credit for the excellence of this range is due Major Benjamin Curtis of the United States Army, who was detailed by the Army to assist with construction of the range.

Chicago has thirty miles of lake front, but, unfortunately, there is no area sufficiently sheltered to afford the smooth water required for rowing. This necessitated holding the rowing events on the Cal Sag Canal. Here the water conditions were excellent. There was no housing, storage space or launching facilities available. All had to be provided at substantial expense.

The Equestrian and Modern Pentathlon events both necessitated major expenditures. Horses for the Modern Pentathlon were purchased eight months in advance of the Games, trained in Texas and brought to Chicago for the event. For the other sports existing facilities were used.

Adequate funds were always available. The Games were sought by Chicago as a medium for helping to further understanding among the peoples of the Americas. It was estimated that the Games would require a subsidy of \$500,000 in addition to the costs absorbed by the federal and city agencies. This proved to be too high, for a figure of \$350,000 was adequate. That, plus gate receipts where charged, retired all expenses and left a surplus.

At the time the Games were awarded to Chicago it was agreed that food and lodging would be provided for three dollars a day per athlete. This, of course, was impossible. Most of the athletes were in residence at the University of Chicago or in hotels in the area. A cost figure of \$8.50 per athlete per day was established. The difference was absorbed by a United States government appropriation of \$250,000.00.

Early contacts revealed that many countries were not going to be able to have full team entries because of the high cost of transportation. Again a United States government appropriation of \$250,000.00 was utilized to make allowances to those teams needing financial help.

Determination had been made to fully carry out the rules of the Pan American Sports Organization, which prescribed cultural events and a sports medicine congress to be held at the time of the Games. These programs are described in detail in another section of this report.

The twenty-nine American Countries eligible to participate Olympic Games make up the Pan American Sports Organization. It is the agency responsible for planning and carrying out the Pan American Games.

The governing Sports Congress is made up of

delegates from the member countries. The Congress decides the program and location for the games. The Sports Congress also selects members of the Executive Committee, which administers events, carries out regulations and handles funds.

## OPENING CEREMONIES

The opening ceremonies of the Third Pan American Games were inaugurated with a formal dinner held in the Crystal Ballroom of the Blackstone Hotel at which The Honorable Roy Rubottom, Acting Assistant Secretary for Inter-American Affairs, was the principal speaker. In attendance were the leaders from all of the participating countries, together with a large number of important Chicago personages. Mayor Richard J. Daley was host for the dinner.

Probably the most impressive happening during the Games period was a field mass celebrated by His Eminence Albert Cardinal Meyer. In attendance were large numbers of the officials and athletes and more than 25,000 Chicagoans. The mass, held in Grant Park, was the first of its kind ever celebrated in the United States.

On the Opening Day of the Games, in accordance with tradition, the competing teams paraded in Chicago's Soldier Field stadium. In advance of the entry of the athletes a special concert was offered by the United States Marine Corps Band from Washington, D.C. and the Women's Army Corps Band.

During the program a Pan American Games Hymn, composed by Agustin Lara, was played by the United States Marine Corps Band, with Mr. Lara conducting.

The United States Marine Corps Drum and Bugle Corps and Drill Team came from Quantico, Virginia, to participate in the ceremonies.

Doctor Milton Eisenhower was named by his brother, the President of the United States, to represent him on the program.

The Games were officially opened by Mayor Richard J. Daley. Fifty thousand persons were in attendance.

Spectacular massed drills were presented by several thousand young people under the direction of the Recreation Department of the Chicago Park District and the Chicago Y.M.C.A.

The ceremonies ended with a spectacular day-light fireworks display, with the flags of the participating nations floating down from the sky after having been released from bombs which burst in the air. The traditional release of pigeons to carry the word to the Americas that the Games were in progress took place.

That night Games officials and athletes, together with Chicago officials, were guests at an enormous outdoor barbecue held in Stagg Field at the University of Chicago. Tons of the finest beef were barbecued and, with the proper accompanying dishes, served to a very appreciative group. The barbecue was followed by a program of entertainment offered by outstanding personalities of the American stage.

## FESTIVAL OF THE AMERICAS

Section Four, Article 22, of the Constitution of the Pan American Sports Organization prescribes that "The Organizing Committee of the Pan American Games shall plan, on each occasion at which the opportunity may arise, cultural and reciprocal information programs on subject of general interest to America."

Abiding by this mandate, the Festival of the Americas was organized.

### MUSIC

On August 19, 21 and 23, the Chicago Park District, in cooperation with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, presented three concerts. The concerts were conducted by the internationally acclaimed Brazilian conductor, Eleazar de Carvalho. He was joined by Cuban pianist, Jorge Bolet, on August 19, and by Brazilian cellist Aldo Parisot on August 21 and 23.

The Chicago Chamber Orchestra, directed by Dieter Kober, presented two afternoon programs of Pan American music at the Chicago Art Institute on August 2 and 9.

The Chicago Fine Arts Quartet, one of the nation's greatest, appeared at the Museum of Science and Industry and presented compositions by Silvestre Revueltas of Mexico; Walter Ashaffenberg, United States; Hector Villa-Lobos, Brazil; Barbara Pentland, Canada; Julian Orton, Cuba; and Ernest Block, United States.

### ART

A special exhibit entitled "The U.S.A. Collects Pan American Art" was presented at the Chicago Art Institute. In the collection were works from eighteen different countries, including paintings of Carlos Merida, Rufino Tamayo, Roberto Matta Echaurren, David Alfaro Siqueiros, Hector Hyppolite, Wilfredo Lam, Jose Clemente Orozco, Jean Paul Ripelle, Graham Coughtry, Jack Shadbolt, and Diego Rivera. This, the first exhibition of its kind, was brought into reality by Mr. Joseph R. Shapiro, prominent Chicago collector.

Private art galleries throughout the Chicago-land area exhibited Pan American paintings, drawings, lithographs and sculpture.

The Chicago Museum of Natural History presented a Pre-Columbian exhibit, "Indian Art of the Americas", which covered archeological and ethnological art discoveries from the period of 2,500 years before Columbus discovered America.

Fifty examples of the finest Latin American architectural achievements of the past ten years were displayed at the Chicago Museum of Science and Industry. The collection of photo-murals and three dimensional slides, which was sponsored by the City of Chicago and the American Institute of Architects, was assembled by the Museum of Modern Art in New York City.

Running simultaneously with the architectural exhibit was a display of contemporary Latin American black and white photography. This collection was developed by Arthur Siegel, former photographic department head at the Illinois Institute of Technology.

## THEATRE

Puerto Rico contributed to the cultural program by sending a group of six outstanding performers from the Instituto de Cultura which appeared at the Goodman Theatre. The group presented "Los Soles Truncos" (The House on Cristo Street) in Spanish.

The Shaw Society of Chicago sponsored a series of dramatic recitals featuring outstanding performers from the United States.

### DANCE

The Mexican Folklore Ensemble from Mexico City, under the direction of Miss Amalia Hernandez, presented brilliant programs in several of Chicago's parks and had in attendance thousands of enthusiastic spectators. The lasting benefit and value of such programs has been evidenced by the fact that through those initial performances the Folklore Ballet became well-known in Chicago and later returned to be greeted by large and enthusiastic audiences.

### BOOK FAIR

A display of more than 2,600 books was presented in the Chicago Public Library. These books were contributed to the Fair by Pan American book publishers, libraries and universities. At the close of the Fair the publications were distributed to educational institutions and libraries in the immediate Chicago area for use by the public.

### SEMINAR PROGRAM

A five-day seminar program (August 10-14), participated in by scholars from Latin America, Canada and the United States, was held at Northwestern University. The seminar discussions and lectures were held with a view towards finding an approach to eliminating areas of misunderstanding and friction in the Western Hemisphere. Papers on the following topics were read and discussed.

It is hoped that the cultural program will continue to be part of the Pan American Games and that this brilliant start will provide the incentive for other cities where the Games are held to carry out such a program.

## SPORTS MEDICINE CONGRESS

To carry out the provision of the Pan American Sports Organization Constitution that conventions on specialized medicine in sports be held simultaneously with Pan American Games events, such a Sports Medicine Congress was organized for September 1 and 2, which Congress was reported to be the most significant event of its kind ever held. The program, which was planned and carried out by Dr. Theodore R. Van Dellan,

Chairman, was presented in Thorne and Wieboldt Halls on the Chicago Campus of Northwestern University.

Paul Dudley White, M.D., world-famed Boston heart specialist who attended President Eisenhower, was the featured speaker at the first plenary session of the Congress. In addition to Dr. White the following speakers appeared on the program:

In addition to the above topics practical demonstrations regarding techniques and treatment of injuries were presented.

## HOSPITALITY

Chicago, known as the United States most friendly city, lived up to its reputation as it showered hospitality on the participants in the III Pan American Games.

Hospitality centers were in operation at all points where athletes were in residence, and thousands of gallons of milk, ice cream, Pepsi Cola and Coca Cola were dispensed without cost to athletes and officials.

Hundreds of the athletes were entertained in the private homes of Chicagoans. All places of entertainment in the city extended special courtesies to the athletes.

In advance of the Games a large corps of Spanish and Portuguese speaking Chicagoans was recruited to be always available to serve as interpreters during the Games.

Seventy-five Pontiac automobiles, supplied by the General Motors Corporation, were assigned to the officials from the participating nations. In addition, hundreds of buses were constantly at the service of the athletes.

## PUBLICITY AND PRESS

Long in advance of the opening of the Third Pan American Games a publicity program was inaugurated. The support of all media of communications was enlisted.

The United States Postal Department was requested to issue, and did in fact do so, a United States Pan American Games postage stamp.

All 1959 vehicle licenses in Chicago carried on the form the story of the Games.

All events which lent themselves to helping to fix attention on the Games were marked by special publicity programs. For example, when the En-tout-cas track arrived from England, the ship was met by a group of Chicagoans of Latin American ancestry and paraded to Soldier Field. The visit to Chicago of the Queen of Greece and Princess Sophie in November of 1958 made possible the import of soil from Athens, the site of the original Olympic Games, which the Princess added to the track material which was being laid in Soldier Field.

Luncheons, dinners and entertainment of all personalities from Latin America who visited Chicago were used to build stories which could be carried back to the Latin American countries.

An effective means of publicity was the distribution of 150,000 T-shirts imprinted with the Pan American Games emblem and the date of the Chicago Games. These shirts were given by Texaco to the youngsters of the Chicago area.

Authorization was given to many firms to make the souvenir type of articles, using the Pan American emblem. Neckties, jewelry, glassware, matches and many other items were made available.

The beautiful Ecuadorian girl, Carmelita Carrion, who came to Chicago to participate in the Pan American Games Queen Contest, won the acclaim of all Chicago. She participated in all events in the period immediately preceding the Games.

A most elaborate press headquarters was established for the Games, and the representatives of the various media of communications who came to Chicago found all the assistance that they could possible need. The picture of the mailing compartments, where complete material concerning results in the various events was filed to be picked up by the various representatives of the press, clearly shows how facilities can be overdone. The accumulation of material which was never picked up is tangible evidence of the expenditure of many wasted dollars.

The closing events of the Pan American Games on Labor Day were highlighted by the holding of the Grand Prix des Nations of the Equestrian events.

A parade of representatives of the competing nations carried their flags in procession around the track to the center of the field where there was fixed to each flag staff streamers in the Pan American Games colors, emblematic of participation in the Third Pan American Games.

Exhibitions were given by a brilliant youth drum and bugle corps, and music was furnished by the Chicago Fire Department and Fifth United States Army Bands.

Following short addresses by Mayor Richard J. Daley and United States Senator from Illinois Paul Douglas, benediction was offered by Father Pat McPolin, the Pan American Games flag was lowered, and the Friendship Torch, which had burned over the Stadium during the Games, was extinguished.

Even in advance of these ceremonies many of the teams had commenced the long trip home, and within three days, all had departed Chicago.

Chicago will long remember the honor which was hers in being permitted to host the Third Pan American Games.
